This is the true story of the atomic bomb.</p>

<p>True Spirit: The True Story of a 16 Year Old Australian Who Sailed Solo, Nonstop, and Unassisted Around the World</p> <p>Watson, Jessica</p>	<p>Narrative Nonfiction, Memoir</p> <p>On May 15, 2010, after 210 days at sea and more than 22,000 nautical miles, 16-year-old Jessica Watson sailed her 33-foot boat triumphantly back to land. She had done it. She was the youngest person to sail solo, unassisted, and nonstop around the world.</p>

Christie, Agatha	Ten strangers--each with a secret in their past--are summoned by an absent millionaire to Indian Island, a private island off the coast of England and begin to die one by one upon arrival.
Homegoing Gyasi, Yaa	Historical Fiction Ghana, eighteenth century: two half sisters are born into different villages, each unaware of the other. One will marry an Englishman and lead a life of comfort in the palatial rooms of the Cape Coast Castle. The other will be captured in a raid on her village, imprisoned in the very same castle, and sold into slavery. Homegoing follows the parallel paths of these sisters and their descendants through eight generations: from the Gold Coast to the plantations of Mississippi, from the American Civil War to Jazz Age Harlem.
Speak (1999 National Book Award Finalist for Young People's Literature) Halse Anderson, Laurie	Mystery, Young Adult Melinda, a freshman in high school, calls the police on a party and becomes an outcast. As she becomes socially outcast, she stops talking to anyone, and her only outlet is her art class. Through art she is able to reveal what happened at that party as she seeks a way to deal with it.
Out of the Dust (Newbery Medal book) Hesse, Karen	Historical Fiction, Poetry In a series of poems, fifteen-year-old Billie Jo relates the hardships of living on her family's wheat farm in Oklahoma during the Dust Bowl years of the Depression.
Call of the Wild London, Jack	Adventure, Animal Fiction A domesticated dog living at a ranch in the Santa Clara valley of California is stolen from home and sold into the brutal existence of an Alaskan sled dog. Buck is forced to adjust to, and survive, cruel treatments and fight to dominate other dogs in a harsh climate.
Boy's Life McCammon, Robert	Mystery, Coming of Age Cory and his father witness a car plunge into a lake - a desperate rescue attempt brings his father face-to-face with a terrible vision of death that will haunt him forever. As Cory struggles to understand his father's pain, he must confront the secrets that hide in the shadows of his hometown -for his father's sanity and his own life hang in the balance.
The Harry Potter Series Rowling, J.K.	Fantasy, Mystery, Coming of Age Eleven year old famous wizard, Harry Potter, is sent to wizarding school to learn magic. He ends up solving a mystery over life and death, all while the most evil of wizards, Lord Voldemort, is trying to kill him.
X: A Novel Shabazz, Ilyasah; Magoon, Kekla	Historical Fiction A novel that documents the youth of Malcolm Little, who later became Malcolm X, from his childhood to his imprisonment at the age of twenty.
The Skinjacker Trilogy (Book 1- Everlost) Shusterman, Neil	Fantasy When Nick and Allie are killed in a car crash, they end up in Everlost, a shadow of the living world, filled with all the things and places that no longer exist; a limbo for lost souls, where, although Nick is satisfied, Allie will stop at nothing--even skinjacking--to break free.
